David Bodenheimer

David Z. Bodenheimer is a partner in the law firm of Crowell & Moring LLP where he heads the Homeland Security Practice and specializes in Government Contracts, Privacy, and Data Security. Resident in the DC office, he joined the firm in 1988 after six years with the United States Navy Department.

Mr. Bodenheimer represents high-technology clients (IT hardware and software, satellite and space services, and military avionics, sensors, and weapons). He has litigated high-profile cases against the federal government and *qui tam* whistleblowers, including *Wynne v. United Technologies Corp.*, 463 F.3d 1261 (Fed. Cir. 2006) (defeating \$299 million defective pricing claim after 33-day trial and Federal Circuit appeal); *United States ex rel. Ackley v. International Business Machines Corp.*, 76 F. Supp. 2d 654 (D. Md. 1999) (briefed and argued jurisdictional dismissal of whistleblower's fraud claims).

Mr. Bodenheimer has testified in House Homeland Security Subcommittee hearings on the SAFETY Act, anti-terrorism technology, and TSA's exemption from federal acquisition laws. As Vice-Chair of the ABA Science and Technology Section's Homeland Security Committee, he supports ABA activities, publications, and panels on the latest technology developments in the homeland security arena. He advises, speaks, and writes extensively on homeland security and biodefense issues (including SAFETY Act coverage, border security, and anti-terrorism technology) with an emphasis on the intersection between government contracts, privacy, and homeland security.

In the privacy and cybersecurity arena, Mr. Bodenheimer handles emerging dilemmas arising out of data sharing, information technology (IT) interoperability, data security and privacy concerns in the homeland security and federal contracting marketplace. His privacy and data security counseling spans the Privacy Act, Federal Information Security Management Act (FISMA), USA PATRIOT Act, electronic workplace monitoring, HSPD authentication and biometrics, and federal electronic surveillance. He is a member of the International Association of Privacy Professionals (IAPP) and is accredited as a Certified Information Privacy Professional.

Jessica R. Herrera-Flanigan is the Staff Director and General Counsel of the House Committee on Homeland Security, where she directs, supervises, and manages the legislative and oversight activities of the Committee's staff. Her responsibilities also include advising Chairman Bennie G. Thompson, D-MS, and other Committee Members on policy and strategy relating to homeland security and global counterterrorism matters.

Before joining the Committee, Ms. Herrera-Flanigan served as Senior Counsel with the Computer Crime & Intellectual Property Section at the U.S. Department of Justice, where she led a team of prosecutors who specialized in cybercrimes and was one of the government's leading experts on critical infrastructure protection, electronic evidence gathering and related procedural and Constitutional law, and international issues. She served as vice-chair to the U.S. Delegation to the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development ("OECD") Experts Group, which produced the 2002 "Guidelines for the Security of Information Systems and Networks: Towards a Culture of Security."

Prior to joining Justice, Ms. Herrera-Flanigan was with Crowell & Moring LLP in Washington, D.C. where she practiced communications, intellectual property, and energy law. Ms. Herrera-Flanigan also has served as a Special Assistant U.S. Attorney in the U.S. Attorney's Office in Washington, D.C., as well as an adjunct professor at the Washington College of Law at American University and at the American Military University.

Ms. Herrera-Flanigan is a Term Member of the Council on Foreign Relations. She is a past President and on the Advisory Council of the Hispanic Bar Association of D.C. and has twice been named one of the 100 Most Influential Hispanics in the U.S. by Hispanic Business magazine. She was honored by Women in Government Relations with its 2007 Congressional Staff Award and by the Women's High Tech Coalition as a 2005 Cybersecurity Woman of the Year.

A native of Port Arthur, Texas, Ms. Herrera-Flanigan received her JD from Harvard Law School and her BA with distinction in American Studies from Yale University.

Andy served as the nation's "cyber security czar" from October 2004 to October 2006 in his role as Acting Director of the National Cyber Security Division (NCSA)/US-CERT of the Department of Homeland Security. Andy served for three and a half years at DHS beginning with his role in the set up and launch of the NCSA beginning in April 2003 after he moved to DHS from the White House staff. In October 2004 Secretary Tom Ridge appointed Andy Acting Director of NCSA and US-CERT. From October to December 2006 Andy served as a Visiting Scientist at the Software Engineering Institute of Carnegie Mellon, working on the Resiliency Engineering Framework with the Financial Services Technology Consortium.

Earlier this year Andy Purdy formed DRA Enterprises, Inc., specializing in information assurance and cyber security, software assurance, business development, and government relations. Andy is doing independent consulting work focusing on business strategy, business development, and technology ventures. In addition, Andy recently completed service as a Special Government Employee on the Defense Science Board Task Force on Foreign Influence on Software Development. Andy is a member of the Executive Advisory Board of BigFix, Inc. He is also a partner in the law firm Allenbaugh Samini, LLP, with offices in California, China, Fairfax, VA, and Bethesda, MD.

Prior to beginning his work in support of DHS, Andy served as a member of the White House staff as Deputy to Howard Schmidt, the Vice Chair of the President's Critical Infrastructure Protection Board (PCIPB), where he helped to draft the *National Strategy to Secure Cyberspace*. Previously, at the United States Sentencing Commission Andy served as Acting General Counsel from November 1999 to January 2001 and was Chief Deputy General Counsel from 1989 until that time.

Andy served as a Federal prosecutor in Philadelphia, Special Counsel to the House Ethics Committee, Counsel to the Senate Impeachment Trial Committee, and Assistant Attorney General in Missouri. He also worked as Senior Staff Counsel to the House Select Committee on Assassinations' investigation of the assassination of President Kennedy. Andy served for five years in network news in Washington at NBC and CBS News.

Andy is a graduate of the College of William and Mary (High Honors in Government) and the University of Virginia Law School, and is a member of the bar in the District of Columbia, Maryland, Missouri, and Pennsylvania.

Before Oblix, he was vice president of technology and operations at Ask Jeeves Inc., where he was responsible for the engineering group and the company's entire IT operation. Prior to that, he led the security business unit at Symantec, helping to grow the unit's revenue from \$200 million to \$460 million over a three year period.

Earlier in his career, Salem was a vice president at Security Pacific Merchant Bank, where he led projects for the development of real-time trading systems.

Salem received a bachelor's degree in computer science from Dartmouth College . He was named 2007 Corporate Executive of the Year by Hispanic Net as well as 2004 Entrepreneur of the Year by Ernst and Young.

Prior to joining PwC, Ms. Westby launched and operated The Work-IT Group, specializing in the legal/regulatory framework for IT and using technology as an economic driver and booster of competitiveness and outsourcing opportunities for developing countries. In January 2003, she developed a methodology and approach for USAID to determine reform priorities for growth of e-commerce and development using ICTs. She has commented on and/or drafted e-commerce legislation for Armenia, Bangladesh, and Bulgaria. Ms. Westby has advised government officials and industry in Bulgaria, Croatia, Macedonia, Romania, Armenia, Serbia, Russia, Vietnam, Bangladesh, Trinidad, Dominica, St. Lucia, Grenada, South Africa, and India.

Prior to founding The Work-ITGroup, Ms. Westby was Chief Administrative Officer and Counsel of In-Q-Tel, Inc., a non-profit corporation devoted to finding unclassified, commercial solutions to IT problems facing the U.S. intelligence community. As a practicing attorney, Ms. Westby practiced international trade, technology, and intellectual property law with the New York firms of Paul, Weiss, Rifkind, Wharton & Garrison and Shearman & Sterling. As Senior Fellow and Director of Information Technology Studies for The Progress & Freedom Foundation, she directed and managed IT projects on an array of cutting-edge issues.

Previously, Ms. Westby was Director of Domestic Policy for the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, where she was responsible for a wide range of business policy issues under her purview. Her department was responsible for influencing national policy in both the

legislative and regulatory arenas in each of these areas. Ms. Westby organized and managed national coalitions and supervised U.S. Chamber involvement in 33 industry coalitions.

Ms. Westby serves as Adjunct Distinguished Fellow to Carnegie Mellon CyLab. She is a member of the bars of the District of Columbia, Colorado and Pennsylvania and the American Bar Association. She is chair of the ABA's Privacy and Computer Crime Committee and was chair, co-author and editor of its International Guide to Combating Cybercrime, International Guide to Cyber Security, International Guide to Privacy, and Roadmap to an Enterprise Security Program (endorsed by the Global CSO Council). Ms. Westby is a member of the World Federation of Scientists' Permanent Monitoring Panel on Information Security and represents the American Bar Association on the Board of the National Conference of Lawyers and Scientists. She also serves on the advisory board of TheIntellectual Property Counselor and Eruces, Inc. Ms. Westby is the author of numerous articles on information security and speaks globally on privacy, security, cybercrime, outsourcing, Homeland Security, and legal issues pertaining to the use of technology.
