Overview

Format and Content

This conference offers a unique forum for exchanging ideas and discussing recent developments in the field of competition law globally. It brings together leading figures in the field from both sides of the Atlantic including members of the judiciary, competition enforcement bodies. academia, in-house counsel and private practice. The conference combines the policy perspective of the Londonbased Interdisciplinary Centre for Competition Law and Policy (ICC) with the real world experience of the international law firm of Crowell & Moring LLP.

This will be a one-day event, with four major areas of focus: international merger control; international cartel procedures; private enforcement, damages claims and recovery; and abuse of dominance. Our aim on this occasion is to take into account the particular perspectives of the business community and explain how important recent developments in competition law affect everyday policies and practices adopted by businesses. All of these topics will be illustrated by practical examples drawn from recent cases taken from the EU, US and other competition law regimes.

The issues to be addressed are:

International merger control

- The practical implications of the European Commission's draft guidelines on nonhorizontal mergers and the current approach to such mergers in the US
- Commitments and remedies: from their design to their offer; how they should be proposed; and their implementation
- Litigation and the implications which flow from merger decisions; third party intervention
- The importance of economic efficiency in merger control and exploring issues of research and development and innovation
- Government action based on national interests

International cartel procedures

- The reality of leniency applications
- The use of plea bargaining in the US and the prospects for its use in the EU
- The calculation of fines under the European Commission's new Guidelines on the method of setting fines

Private enforcement, damages claims and recovery

- Incentives and approaches to recovery actions: fiduciary obligations to shareholders and keeping up with competitors; settlement negotiations; arbitration and mediation
- The current European Commission's initiative and the future of private enforcement in the EU
- Practical legal issues such as forum selection, indirect purchasers, passing-on, assessment of damages and enforcement of judgments

Abuse of dominance

- Discrimination and exploitative abuses; how the European Commission's proposed approach is likely to affect future behaviour of dominant firms
- Recent practice at community and national level; differences in national approaches and regulation: impact on unilateral behaviour
- Case prioritisation and the handling of complaints about abuse of dominance by the European Commission and national competition authorities




